Dorset Music Hub Schools' Update -November 2023

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Benedetti Foundation Dorset Residency



Dorset Music Hub was delighted to collaborate with the Benedetti Foundation in order to bring their acclaimed residency sessions to Dorset in October.

This partnership project resulted in the Benedetti Foundation working with over 1,000 Dorset pupils providing workshops in a number of our primary schools, middle schools and special needs schools. The week culminated in a specialist string day for pupils learning the violin, viola, cello or double bass and was attended by over 80 young string players.

The Benedetti team inspired all the children involved in their sessions to feel musical and part of a music community regardless of their age and ability.

As well as inspiring the children and young people of Dorset, the Benedetti Foundation also ran an after-school training session for class teachers, providing them with a wealth of ideas to take back to their schools to enhance the provision that currently takes place - benefitting a large cohort of children and young people who weren't able to directly participate in the Residency sessions.

The Benedetti Foundation also worked with instrumental music teachers on how to provide inquisitive and purposeful teaching, and how to plan for success for all pupils regardless of the instrument they play. This session also provided an opportunity for the instrumental teachers to meet and establish links with others in the area, building a sense of community which was an added benefit to the training.

Through this project with Dorset Music Hub, the Benedetti Foundation could share their expertise with the Dorset music community and were able to inspire both students and teachers to feel musical and inspired by music. Dorset Music Hub is funded to support music education in schools and communities across Dorset by working with partners, such as the Benedetti Foundation, to

achieve impactful events and opportunities like this to ensure the best musical outcomes for children and young people in Dorset.

Count me in! A new approach to group music-making - NEW DATE



Free online seminar with Dr Beth Pickard and *Live Music Now* - Wednesday 6th December, 4.00-5.30pm

Come along to the session to find out more about how this approach to ensemble music-making is accessible to ALL class teachers and ALL young learners.

Count Me In! is an engaging, practical set of classroom resources for making music inclusively with children and young people. This is a versatile framework that will support colleagues to increase their confidence, developing ensemble music-making in the primary classroom or co-curricular session. It will support class teachers to enable the full inclusion of all music-makers, including young learners with additional needs.

In the session, Dr Beth Pickard will present a practical introduction to *Count Me In!*, enabling teachers to start using the resources with their classes. Participants will learn:

- How to use the Sounds of Intent framework to assess the musical skills of pupils
- How to use the *Count Me In!* approach to create a whole class ensemble in which every child plays a meaningful musical role based on their skills

Musicianship Programme reminders



Has your school had the Musicianship Programme this term or are you expecting it next term?

Autumn Term schools:

Once your sessions have finished this term, we will be collecting the instruments or equipment from your school. For schools that have had ukuleles or recorders, we ask for your assistance with a few things regarding packing the instruments so that the collection process goes as smoothly as possible.

Please ensure that:


- instruments that have been going home with pupils stay in school after your final session;
- the correct instrument is in the correct case (to check this, please compare the DMS ID number on your instrument list with the one handwritten on the case ignore the number on any keyrings attached);
- instruments are packed back in the bags or boxes they were delivered in.

Spring Term schools:

- Please check your Musicianship Programme allocation (which we confirmed via email in July) and, if the number of children taking part has changed, please let us know as soon as possible.
- If you have planned for more than one class to participate, you need to purchase additional classes (at £126 each) via the <u>Dorset Music Hub page on Nexus</u> as the standard whole-class Musicianship Programme, included as part of DMH membership, is for one class per school.

We will be in contact very soon with your collection or delivery information.

Next Steps - after the Musicianship Programme



Every child should be able to experience the joy of music - we are offering a **free instrument loan** for all those pupils who have completed the Musicianship Programme this year.

As part of our 'Next Steps' programme we can offer free instrument loan for one year to pupils who are learning with a music teacher in the school setting - this could be during or out of school hours.

You are welcome to use your existing music teachers to access this offer and we encourage you to speak with them to see if they would like to deliver a demonstration or talk to your class about what it's like to learn to play their instrument.

We want children to follow their own musical paths so giving a choice of instrument will set children on their journey of music and hopefully create a lifelong love of music.

If you don't currently have any music tuition happening in school, then do get in touch with us to see what we may be able to offer you or which local teachers we could put you in touch with.

Creative Musical Nurture Groups



Help boost the resilience and confidence of your most vulnerable pupils through this exciting programme.

A Creative Musical Nurture Group (CMNG) is a weekly creative, instrumental music session for 3-5 children in KS2 or KS3. Participants are identified by schools as being vulnerable and at risk of poor outcomes due to mental health, behaviour, or general confidence difficulties.

The CMNG provides a calm and nurturing environment where children can build their resilience and agency and develop a sense of belonging through music.

Each CMNG of 3-5 children has a cost of £400, based around 1 term's delivery - Dorset Music Hub will fund 25% of the cost. For advice on how to fund the remaining £300, <u>please contact your</u> <u>Education Challenge Lead at your local locality office</u>.

If you have pupils who you think would benefit from a CMNG, please discuss this offer with your SENCo as they will need to be involved throughout the process.

Music Mentoring - for students experiencing barriers to education



Our Music Mentoring programme is tailored towards young people with social, emotional and/or mental health barriers, and with personal outcomes such developing resilience, agency and a sense of belonging through music. These outcomes are just as important as musical ones in this 1:1 programme.



The programme comprises ten weekly sessions that last for 45 minutes each. During the sessions, the leader guides the young person in making his/her/their own music. This music is created with the help of an online digital audio workstation (BandLab). The use of instruments (or vocals) is optional. Typically, by the end of the programme, the young person will have completed several tracks or songs.

It's possible to arrange sessions at the student's home, in school, or at other alternative settings such as youth centres.
